***BCCD will not be responsible for plant stock once it is removed from the pickup site. Put your plants in the ground as soon as possible after pickup.***

Belknap CCD's 32<sup>nd</sup> annual fundraising sale is offering a wide variety of plants . Please read our plant Description pages; they're full of information! IF we have plants left over we will have a Surplus Plant Sale.

**Note:** when you pick up your plants most of them will be dormant (not yet leafed out) and will be packed 'bareroot' meaning they are not in soil. We keep the roots moist and the plants in cold storage to simulate winter conditions until a few days before you pick them up.

**Important Tip:** When choosing your plants, it is important to note what the appropriate soil conditions & light requirements are for your selections. The Order Form and Descriptions section have symbols and a key to guide you.

## Information and Commonly asked questions:

- ◇ **USDA Plant Hardiness Zone** is the standard by which gardeners can determine which plants are most likely to thrive at a location. Belknap County is within USDA Plant Hardiness Zone range of 4b to 5b with some scattered areas of Zone 6a. To see what zone your town may be within check out this website and enter your zip code. <http://planthardiness.ars.usda.gov/phzmweb/interactivemap.aspx>  
We typically offer plant varieties with a USDA Hardiness Zone of 4 or lower (more cold tolerant) and indicate on the sales forms when a plant prefers Zone 5. Belknap County zones are 4b-6a depending on area. Link to zone map. <https://www.plantmaps.com/hardiness-zones-for-belknap-county-new-hampshire>
- ◇ **Will all the plants survive?** Most of them will. Typically 70-95% of seedlings, 80-95% of transplants, 90-100% of grafted fruit trees, 95% of containerized items survive. Keeping the roots healthy is key.
- ◇ **What is the difference between those types?** "Seedlings" are from cuttings grown in one place or seed; transplants, ie (2-3) grew 2 years as a seedling then moved for more space to a transplant bed for 3 years. This results in a sturdier plant with greater root, stem and branch development & more shape. Grafted fruit trees have the rootstock of one variety of tree spliced with a branch from another variety to help control how big the tree will get, fruit maturation, & to improve overall performance.
- ◇ **What can I do to help them?** bareroot stock - plant will come wrapped in damp packing material, not in soil. Take your plants home and get them in the ground quickly, especially the bare items. If you want to soak your plants in water, leave them for no longer than an hour, longer than that can damage them. If you can't plant them as soon as you get home, leave them in their wrappers in a cool, dark place. If it will be more than a few days, the plants might prefer if you heel them in: dig an angled trench, remove the wrappings, put the roots into the trench, water them, then cover with soil and water again. Roots dry out very quickly, so it is important to keep them covered with moist wrappings while you work on planting others in the package. Containerized plants are not in soil and will also dry out if not frequently watered.
- ◇ **Do I really need to cut back the fruit trees?** It helps them recover from losing roots during harvesting, & develop a better shape for fruit production. There is a method and reason for how trees are pruned. We will provide information for you when you pick up your plants.
- ◇ **Do I need 2 varieties to get fruit or nuts?** Most often, yes. Cross pollination usually means plants need pollen from another variety of the same type of plant. For example: Blueray Blueberries don't pollinate Blueray Blueberries—you need a different kind of blueberry or wild blueberry to pollinate. Same for apples. Some nut trees will cross pollinate within the same variety and having more than one tree helps production.

Fir, Balsam <i>Abies balsamea</i>	☉❖🌿N A	M 60-75'	Symmetrical Christmas tree. Balsam aroma, good needle retention. 3/4" flat needles, tolerates most soils prefers acidic, well-drained, sandy, moist soil. Don't plant in frost pocket or hot southern slope
Fir, Concolor <i>Abies concolor</i>	☉◐❖🌿	M 80-120'	White fir Christmas tree excellent needle retention, also good ornamental. Silvery blue green 2-3" needles. Fragrance like oranges.
<b>CONSERVATION, WILDLIFE, GROUNDCOVERS &amp; OTHER ITEMS</b>			
Bayberry, Northern <i>Morella pensylvanica</i>	☉◐❖ A N	M 12' H 12' W	Lustrous, green foliage; semi-evergreen. Leaves aromatic when crushed. Noted for waxy-gray berries, fall and winter; berries used to make bayberry candle scent. For pollination best to plan two or more, plant several for landscaping effect. Plants will sucker, spread and colonize if left unchecked. Good soil stabilizing plant. <b>(N) G</b>
Cranberry, High Bush (aka American Cranberry bush) <i>Viburnum trilobum</i>	☉◐🌿❖A (N)(S)	M 6-10'	Clusters of white flowers in June, bright red berries in fall persisting into winter. Very tart fruit, substitute for true cranberries, use for jams, jellies, sauces. Good for hedges, borders, shore land, birds & wild turkeys. Good wildlife cover wildlife; deer & moose enjoy twigs. Hardiness Zone 2-7
Honeysuckle, Dwarf <i>(Diervilla lonicera)</i>	☉◐❖🌿	2-3'H; 2-3'W	Summer blooms of trumpet shaped red-orange. A small non-invasive plant with dense growth habit of dark-green pointed leaves and roots that sucker. This is not a true honeysuckle.
Dogwood, Red Osier <i>Cornus sericea (stolonifera)</i>	☉🌿❖☹️☠ (N)(S)	R 7-10'	Colorful all year round. Bright red twigs and branchlets. Small white flowers in flat topped clusters. May – Aug. white fruit July - Oct. Good for wildlife and shoreland. Can cause nausea if eaten, planted as ornamental.
Pachysandra <i>(Pachysandra terminalis)</i>	☉◐●●❖🌿	R 6-12"	Grows in sun or shade, to a uniform height of 6-12". Excellent in masses under heavy shade of trees. A dense, lustrous evergreen, trailing vine-type of ground cover. White flowers March-early April. Plant 6" apart, for a pleasing effect immediately and form to a solid ground cover in 2 years. Any soil. Water liberally. VERY HARDY. Fine for terraces or places where grass is not successful.
Serviceberry, Alleghny <i>(Amelanchier, laevis)</i>	☉◐🌿❖	M - R 25"	The round leaves are red-orange in the fall. Large white flowers produce bluish purple, juicy, fruit that attract birds and other wildlife. Grows best in partial shade in well drained soil but not droughty.
Sumac, Fragrant <i>(Rhus aromatica)</i>	☉◐🌿❖	M 2-3'H; 5-6'W	Dense, low-growing, deciduous shrub with glossy, trifoliate leaves that are fragrant when crushed. Small yellow flowers in spring are followed by hairy red fruit, attractive to butterflies and birds. Excellent orange-red fall color. Tolerant of poor soils and drought. Use for groundcover, slopes, erosion control, border, woodland garden. Deer may browse.
Weigela, Variegated <i>(Weigela florida 'Variegata')</i>	☉◐🌿❖☹️	H & W 4.5'	Popular ornamental with red/pink flowers blooming from spring to fall. Low maintenance, prune only old growth flowers grow on 2nd year growth. 2-4 inch leaves. Attracts hummingbirds/butterflies. Deer browse resistant.
Willow, Pussy <i>(Salix discolor)</i>	☉◐❖🌿● NS	M 12-20	White-silver haired catkins on naked shoots in late winter, often used in decoration, keep plant trimmed for easy cutting. Important source of food for many species and provides cover for some. Also good erosion control plant.
Shade Tree Pac	10 plants total: <b>2 Sycamore</b> ( <i>Platanus occidentalis</i> ) Grows 60-120' tall with large trunk and wide branching, largest of American hardwoods, prefers rich, moist soil. Mottled bark with brown, white, yellow, green. Large green leaves. Ball shaped fruit with a hairy nut-like seed hanging on stem. Valuable timber tree, seed eaten by birds -CAUTION – seeds are poisonous to horses and can irritate human skin.; <b>2 Red Maple</b> ( <i>Acer rubrum</i> ) Rapid growth to 75-90'feet in most soils. Fall color is yellow to scarlet. Important wildlife tree for browsers.; <b>2 Hybrid Poplar</b> ( <i>Populus hybrid</i> ) Very fast growing to 50'high to 30'wide, full sun. Stabilizes soil on streambanks and farmland but not good as a street or yard tree due to powerful roots. Lifespan 50 years.; <b>2 Silver Maple</b> ( <i>Acer saccharinum</i> ) Rapid growth to 60-80'feet in moist soils with full sun. Buds eaten by squirrels, seeds eaten by birds and mammals, tree browsed by beaver, deer, and rabbits; <b>2 Red Oak</b> ( <i>Quercus rubra</i> ) Fast growing to 50-70'feet. Prefers to grow in slightly acidic soil but is drought tolerant and can grow in loamy, moist, sandy, well drained and clay soils. Bristle-tipped leaves turn red in autumn. The brown round acorn is round feed blue jays, wild turkeys, squirrels, small rodents, whitetail deer, raccoons, and black bears. Deer also browse the buds and twigs in wintertime.		
Turkey Forage Pac	10 plants total; 12-18" inches: <b>2 Black Oak</b> ( <i>Quercus velutina</i> ) Grows to 50'feet tall with rounded crown in full sun in well drained/moist soil. Furrowed black bark, dark green leaves, large acorn crop every 2-3 years feed wild range of wildlife; <b>2 Wild Grape</b> ( <i>Vitis riparia</i> ) Vine grows to 75'feet with long wide leaves, new bark is yellow green turning brown and shredded as matures. Mature trunk can be 3-8 inches. Round 1/2 inch fruit ripens from green to blue-black, with 1-6 egg-shaped seeds. Berries are sour until a frost, then turn sweet-tart. Can become dense and aggressive within wooded edges and disturbed soils, however, is important food		

	source for insects and wildlife; <b>2 Washington Hawthorn</b> ( <i>Crataegus phaenopyrum</i> ) Prefers full sun, white buds bloom in June producing small red fruit that stay on tree in winter, mature height 30 feet, width 25 feet. <b>2 Sargents Crabapple</b> ( <i>Malus sargentii</i> ) Prefers full sun, moist well drained soils, white blooms in May producing small red fruit. Mature height 10 feet, width 10 feet. <b>2 Black Elderberry</b> ( <i>Sambucus nigra</i> ) Grows 8-20'feet with multi-stems in full sun/part shade in moist to wetter soils. Roots sucker. Tiny white clustered flowers in early summer turn to small purple/black berries eaten by wildlife and into jellies and pies by us. May make pets ill if eaten in large quantities.		
Wetland Pack	10 plants total; 12-18" inches: <b>2 Northern Spice Bush</b> ( <i>Lindera benzoin</i> ) Prefer full sun/tolerates shade. Mature height 9-12 feet. Red/brown blooms produce red berries that last into winter. All parts of plant fragrant during spring/summer. <b>Pussy Willow</b> ( <i>Salix discolor</i> ) Grows to 12-20'feet. White-silver catkins on shoots in late winter, important source of food for many species and provides cover. Good erosion control plant. <b>River Birch</b> ( <i>Betula nigra</i> ) Mature height 60'feet. Prefers full sun can tolerate part shade, does well in both well-drained or moist soils, can tolerate some flooding. Produces catkins in May and small nutlets in summer. Bark is cinnamon colored and curls on the stem. <b>Button Bush</b> ( <i>Cephalanthus occidentalis</i> ) Mature height 6-12 feet Blooms in June with small, white, "button shaped" flowers that produce small nutlets for wildlife only. <u>Poisonous to grazing animals.</u> <b>Nannyberry</b> ( <i>Viburnum lentago</i> ) Mature height 30 feet. Prefers full sun can tolerate part shade. Small clusters of white flowers in May/June. Fruits start out green and change to colors of yellow, rose and pink before turning black in September-November and persists into winter. Good for birds and wildlife, can use as hedge. Will grow in woods.		
<b>DECIDUOUS AND NUT TREES</b>			
Hazelnut, (aka American Filbert) <i>Corylus americana</i>	○❖☞☒N	M-R 10-15' H	Easy growing. Broad tree, round top, dark green foliage turns light yellow in fall, flowers in May-June. Nuts mature September, drop from husks and are eaten by turkey, grouse, quail, pheasant, humans, and deer. Need 2 to pollinate.
Larch, American <i>Larix laricina</i>	○❖☞N	R 40-60' H; 15-30 W	Aka Tamarack, Hackmatack. Tree grows straight, pyramid shaped, with short light blue-green needles that turn yellow and drop in fall/winter. Grows in moist soils, shade tolerant, cold tolerant. Favorite for bonsai. Found near swamps and bogs. Grouse eat the buds/seeds, is cover for mammals such as deer.
Maple, Sugar <i>Acer saccharum</i>	○☞☞❖☒N	M 60-120'	Gorgeous fall color. Largest maple. Commercial value for syrup and wood. Needs protection from wildlife when young. Generally not browsed by deer.
<b>EDIBLES BERRIES, ROOTS, BULBS &amp; OTHERS OF INTEREST</b>			
Asparagus, Mary Washington	○❖☒☞	M 3-6' H	A Viking strain. Will produce abundance of tender, flavorful shoots in second year of growth.
Asparagus Purple Passion	○❖☒☞☞	M 3-6'	Purple Passion has attractive purple color. Flavor and tenderness distinguish this variety. Best when planted 6-8 inches apart. Cooking reduces purple color
Blueberry, BlueCrop	○❖☞☒A	M 4-8' H	Mid-season (July) producer bears fruit first year after planting. Plants are known for hardiness, vigor and consistent production. Produces a high volume of large, bright blue berries. Prefers acidic soils pH 4.5-5.0
